

RETURNEE INFLOW FROM PAKISTAN





Since 15 September, there has been a notable surge in the number of returnees to Afghanistan, taking place primarily through the Torkham and Spin Boldak border crossings. The announcement on 3 October by Pakistan's national Apex Committee of the plan¹ to repatriate over a million foreigners without valid documents, mostly Afghans triggered a consistent and steep increase in the number of undocumented and ACC holders crossing the border points. This culminated at the beginning of November in line with the ultimatum of 1 November given to illegal foreigners residing in Pakistan by Pakistan's Minister of Interior. There have been over 471,500 returnees recorded during this period, with numbers increasing from less than 200 per day in early October to more than 25,000 by early November. This influx, consisting largely of forced returns, also includes a large number of deportations. Since the initial peak around November 1st, the number of individuals crossing these official border points have consistently decreased but remains higher than pre-September 15th.



ASSISTED RETURNEES TO AFGHANISTAN



Consortium Partners have progressively scaled up and adjusted operations at both Spin Boldak and Torkham Border Points to respond to the significant increased on returns since mid-September 2023, in coordination with the DFA. Currently, the capacity of partners maintained at these locations allow for assistance provision the day of arrival.

GENDER OF RETURNEES (CUMULATIVE)




The accumulation of demographic information collected during registration identifies the majority of assisted returnees are children and adolescents (62%). Approximately 24% of returnees are children under 5. Additionally, the demographics indicate that 48% of assisted returnees are women.

In Spin Boldak and Torkham, a total of 1,656 individuals received assistance as part of the voluntary repatriation program.



(UNDOCUMENTED/ACC RETURNEES)



Cumulative data collected during the provision of assistance at the Spin Boldak and Torkham border crossing points indicate the vast majority of returnees (88%) aim to return to their provinces of origin, with 84% planning to resettle to their district of origin. The majority of returnees aim to resettle in Nangahar, Kandahar, Kunar, Kabul, and Kunduz.
